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Accio Yarn!

From the heart of my favorite magical world comes this pattern by yours truly!

Materials

- Yarn: Worsted Weight 4 (Red Heart in Coffee, Black, Buff, Burgundy, Gold, Guava, White
- Hook: 4.0 mm/G 3.5 mm/E
- Notions: poly-fil, scissors, yarn needle

Sizing

- Finished plush measures 7.5 inches from top to bottom
- Gauge: 4 stitches and 4 rows is = 1"

Pattern Key

- Ch: Chain
- Sl St: Slip Stitch
- Sc/Dc: US Single Crochet/UK Double Crochet
- Dec: Decrease

Experience Level

Intermediate

Specialty Stitching

US Single Crochet/UK Double Crochet: Insert hook in stitch indicated and pull up a loop (two loops on hook), yarn over, pull through both loops on hook.

Decrease: Insert hook in stitch indicated and pull up a loop, insert hook in next stitch and pull up a loop, yarn over and pull through all loops on hook.

- Pattern is written in American (US) and English (UK) terms. (US/UK = sc/dc)
- Body of pattern is worked in one continuous spiral;
 you will not join or chain at end of each row
- I advise using a stitch marker to keep track of your first stitch
- If you do not want to use the Magic Circle Method, you can also use the chain two method in which you chain two and then do your first set of stitches in the first chain

Yardage

- 136 yards of coffee
- 104 yards of buff
- 42 yards of black
- 21 yards of gold
- 21 yards of burgundy
- 2 yards of guava
- 1 yard of white
- Scrap of café for scar

Approximately 327 total yards

Body with 4.00 mm hook

- 1: Using Buff yarn begin with Magic Circle or ch 2, create 6 sc/dc in circle and tighten so there is no hole (6)
- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st (12)
- 3: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next, repeat from * (18)
- 4: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (24)
- 5: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (30)
- 6: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (36)
- 7: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (42)
- 8: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 6 st, repeat from * (48)
- 9: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (54)
- 10: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from
 * (60)
- 11-26: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 27: change to black yarn and sc/dc in each st (60)
 - Note: Jogging during color changes will be covered by scarf.
- 28-30: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 31: *dec, sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from * (54)
- 32: *dec, sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (48)
- 33: *dec, sc/dc in next 6 st, repeat from * (42)
- 34: *dec, sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (36)
 - Begin stuffing here
- 35: *dec, sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (30)
- 36: *dec, sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (24)
- 37: *dec, sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (18)
- 38: *dec, sc/dc in next st, repeat from * (12)
 - Make sure body is stuffed firmly before closing
- 39: *dec, repeat from *, tie off and weave in ends (6)

Scarf (done in 2 pieces with 3.5 mm hook) 1st piece:

With Gold Yarn

- 1: ch 6, sc/dc in 2^{nd} ch from hook and each additional ch, ch 1 and turn (5)
- 2-3: sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn
- 4-6: with burgundy, sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn
- 7-9: with gold, sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn

Continue repeating rows 4-6 and 7-9 alternating colors until you have 10 gold stripes and 10 burgundy stripes and measures approximately 16'' long, sl st last row to $1^{\rm st}$ row making a round scarf, tie off and leave length for sewing

2nd Piece

With Gold Yarn

- 1: ch 6, sc/dc in 2^{nd} ch from hook and each additional ch, ch 1 and turn (5)
- 2-3: sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn
- 4-6: with burgundy, sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn
- 7-9: with gold, sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn

Continue repeating rows 4-6 and 7-9 until you have 4 gold stripes and 4 burgundy stripes. Tie scraps of gold and burgundy to each end of this piece.

Tip: I use the scraps that I cut after weaving in all of the ends of the scarf for the fringe at the ends of this piece.

- After slip stitching ends of piece 1 together to form a round scarf, place piece just above 1st row of black
- Fold 2nd piece of scarf and slip behind the 1st piece and fold over to make it drape with the fringe hanging down. Attach 1st piece around the body so that the bottom is level with the 1st row of black and piece 1 is hanging off center on the front of your plush. See picture for reference



Two pieces of Scarf ready for assembly



After slip stitching ends of piece 1 together to form a round scarf, place piece just above 1st row of black.



Fold Piece 2 of scarf over front of Piece 1 so that the fringe is hanging towards the bottom of the plush.



Glasses are attached at row 18. Stitch the nose piece on to the face by stitching around row 18 and the nose piece until secure and leave lenses to sit away from the face.

Glasses with 4.00mm hook

With Black Yarn

Ch 15, sl st to $1^{\rm st}$ ch to make a loop, create 21 sc/dc around loop, sl st to bottom of $1^{\rm st}$ sc/dc, ch 19, sl st to $4^{\rm th}$ ch making a new loop. Create 21 sc/dc around this loop, sl st to top of $1^{\rm st}$ sc/dc, tie off and leave length for sewing.

• Attach glasses at row 18. I sew the glasses on by just attaching the nose piece of the glasses. This way the lenses sit out from the face a bit but you can do a few stitches along the bottom of the lenses if you need to

Eyes with 4.00mm hook (make 2)

With Black Yarn changing to White

1: Create 5 sc/dc in black and 1 sc/dc in white inside the magic circle. (6)

Change to Green Yarn

- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st, sl st to top of $1^{\rm st}$ st, tie off and leave length for sewing. (12)
 - Attach eyes to face so that they sit to the bottom right of each lens. See picture for reference.


Wig Cap with 4.00 mm hook

With Brown Yarn

- 1: Begin with Magic Circle or ch 2, create 6 sc/dc in circle and tighten so there is no hole (6)
- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st (12)
- 3: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next, repeat from * (18)
- 4: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (24)
- 5: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (30)
- 6: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (36)
- 7: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (42)

- 8: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 6 st, repeat from * (48)
- 9: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (54)
- 10: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from
 * (60)
- 11-13: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 14: sc/dc in each st, tie off and leave length to sew to body (60)
 - Wig Cap is attached at an angle to the top of the plush, with the front of the cap sitting at row 11 and the back of the cap sitting just above his scarf.
 - You will not add your hair until after the Wig Cap is sewn onto the plush. See assembly notes and picture tutorials below.
 - Don't forget his scar. I used a scrap of taupe yarn just dark enough against the skin to sew a lightning bolt on his forehead just above his right lens.





Attaching the hair is fun and easy. After sewing your Wig Cap on you will then cut some lengths for your hair. I cut a bunch but you can always cut more if you run out and I also cut them pretty long so that folded they are about 4 inches long.

Step 1: I find where Harry's part will be and do a row straight along that line working from the face to the crown of the head. Folding the pieces in half and then pull the folded piece through with my hook and then use my fingers to pull the ends through the loop. Similar to latch hook.

Step 2: Beginning on the outside round of the cap I work around the last round adding pieces in each st

Step 3: Then I work on every other row and every other stitch until I am at the top of the wig cap or row


- See images above for help on hair placement.
- Fold pieces in half, put your hook into the stitch you want the hair in and pull the folded end through the wig cap, creating a loop. You will then pull the cut end through the loop to secure. This is similar to latch hook.

- Yarn: Worsted Weight 4 (Red Heart in Cafe, Buff, Charcoal, Burgundy, Gold, Coffee, White
- Hook: 4.0 mm/G, 3.5 mm/E
- Notions: poly-fil, scissors, yarn needle
- Dowel rods and steamer or oven for hair

Sizing

- Finished plush measures 7.5 inches from top to bottom
- Gauge: 4 stitches and 4 rows is = 1"

Pattern Key

Written in American/UK Terms

- Ch: Chain
- Sl St: Slip Stitch
- Sc/Dc: Single Crochet/UK Double Crochet
- Hdc/Htr: Half Double Crochet/Half Double Crochet
- Dc/Tr: Double Crochet/Treble
- Dec: Decrease

Experience Level

Specialty Stitching

US Single Crochet/UK Double Crochet: Insert hook in stitch indicated and pull up a loop (two loops on hook), yarn over, pull through both loops on hook.

US Half Double Crochet/UK Half Treble Crochet: Yarn over and insert hook in stitch indicated. Pull up a loop (3 loops on hook), yarn over and pull through all three loops on hook.

US Double Crochet/ UK Treble Crochet: Yarn over and insert hook in stitch indicated. Pull up a loop (3 loops on hook), yarn over and pull through two loops on hook, yarn over and pull through remaining two loops on hook.

Decrease: Insert hook in stitch indicated and pull up a loop, insert hook in next stitch and pull up a loop, yarn over and pull through all loops on hook.

- If you do not want to use the Magic Circle Method, you can also use the chain two method in which you chain two and then do your first set of stitches in the first chain

- 104 yards of buff
- 52 yards of café
- 42 yards of charcoal
- 1 yards of black
- 1 yards of gold

- 2 yards of burgundy
- 2 yards of coffee
- 1 yard of white

Body with 4.00 mm hook

- 1: Using Buff yarn begin with Magic Circle or ch 2, create 6 sc/dc in circle and tighten so there is no hole (6)
- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st (12)
- 3: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next, repeat from * (18)
- 4: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (24)
- 5: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (30)
- 6: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (36)
- 7: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (42)

Tie with 3.5 mm hook

With Burgundy Yarn

1: ch 5, sc/dc in 2^{nd} ch from hook, sk 2 st and sc/dc in last ch, ch 1 and turn (2)

2-4: sc/dc in each st, ch 1 and turn (2)

5: sc/dc in each st, tie off and leave length for sewing and finishing

- Use length to wrap tightly around the tie between row 4 and 5 to create the illusion of a knot.
- Use gold yarn to sew stripes onto your tie.
- Attach tie at the center front of your plush at row 25.



Lapels with 3.5 mm hook (make 2)

With White Yarn

- 1: ch 9, sl st in 2nd st from hook, sl st in next ch, sc/dc in next 2 sts, hdc/htr in next 2 sts, dc/tr in next 2 sts, tie off and leave length for sewing.
 - Use length to sew lapels on either side of tie to row 25.

Eyes with 3.5 mm hook (make 2)

Rnd 1: With black yarn create a magic circle, make 5 sc/dc in black and one sc/dc in white inside the magic circle, join to $1^{\rm st}$ stitch, tighten so there is no hole, tie off and weave in ends (6 sc/dc)

Rnd 2: With brown yarn join with a sc/dc in the 1^{st} black st of previous round, 1 more sc/dc in same st, 2 sc/dc in next 3 sts, do not tie off, continue with Rnd 3. (8 sc/dc)

Next round is continued by joining with a sl st.

Rnd 3: change to black and sl st in next 4 sts, change to white and sl st in next 7 st, tie off and length for sewing. (11 sl sts)

• Attach both eyes to face at row 16 with 4 stitches in the space between them. You will want to make sure they are centered on the front of the plush above the tie and lapels.



Wig Cap with 4.00 mm hook

With Cafe Yarn

- 1: Begin with Magic Circle or ch 2, create 6 sc/dc in circle and tighten so there is no hole (6)
- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st (12)
- 3: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next, repeat from * (18)
- 4: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (24)
- 5: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (30)
- 6: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (36)
- 7: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (42)
- 8: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 6 st, repeat from * (48)
- 9: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (54)
- 10: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from
 * (60)
- 11-14: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 15: sc/dc in each st, tie off and leave length to sew to body (60)

- Wig Cap is attached at an angle to the top of the plush, with the front of the cap sitting at row 11 and the back of the cap sitting just above her sweater.
- You will not add your hair until after the Wig Cap is sewn onto the plush. See assembly notes and picture tutorials below.




After sewing your Wig Cap on you will then need to make your yarn curl. There are a couple different methods to do this. I wrapped my yarn around eight 12" x 3/16 dowel rods taping it at the top and bottom and making sure to fill them completely so I have lots of yarn to work with. I then lay them on a board and steam them, turning to make sure I get all sides. Then I leave them to dry for a couple hours and take the yarn off of the rods and cut them to length. There are two different lengths for this project.

If you don't have a steamer you can also use an oven for about an hour at 250. Just tie the yarn at the ends because you will not want to use tape, wet the yarn and make sure to sit them on a pan with the ends of the dowels on the edges and the yarn not touching anything so it will not burn or melt.



Attaching the hair is fun and easy. Check out the diagram below for more help with this.



Step 1 and 2: With the first 6 rods I cut them pretty long for the top of the head. I wrap them around a small notebook but you just need a surface about 7" in length to wrap them around and cut on just one side, leaving a 14" length. They will be much shorter when they curl back up. These pieces will be attached at the part starting up at round 7 working my way back and around round 1 of the wig cap.

• Fold pieces in half, put your hook into the stitch you want the hair in and pull the folded end through the wig cap, creating a loop. You will then pull the cut end through the loop to secure. This is similar to latch hook.

Step 3: Using the yarn on the remaining 2 rods I cut the remaining yarn by wrapping them around my four fingers, making them about 6.5" in length. I use these in every other stitch around the side and back of the wig cap. This gives the illusion of thick hair. You can add more hair if you would like.

Step 4: I then attach some straight lengths to the front of the wig cap for bangs. To get the length I wrap the yarn around my four fingers, making them about 6.5" in length. I attach these across the front just under the beginning of the part at round 6 and 7. Then trim the bangs to get them a bit even.

- Color Changes: To change colors, do not finish last stitch before new color, instead pull new color through last two loops of previous color to finish stitch and create next stitch with new color.
- When working the small graph in this pattern you will not need to carry your yarn. You can instead drop it to the inside of the plush until you need to pick it up again. Just be careful not to pull too tightly so it will not warp your image or your plush.

Yardage

- 136 yards of carrot
- 104 yards of buff
- 1 yard of black
- 20 yards of gold
- 53 yards of burgundy
- 2 yards of deft blue
- 1 yard of white

Approximately 317 total yards

Body with 4.00 mm hook

- 1: Using Buff yarn begin with Magic Circle or ch 2, create 6 sc/dc in circle and tighten so there is no hole (6)
- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st (12)
- 3: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next, repeat from * (18)
- 4: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (24)
- 5: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (30)
- 6: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (36)
- 7: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (42)
- 8: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 6 st, repeat from * (48)
- 9: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (54)
- 10: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from
 * (60)
- 11-24: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 25: change to burgundy yarn and sl st in each st of round 24 (60)
 - Note: Jogging during color changes will be covered by hair.
- 26: sc in each st of round 24
 - Working from here until next note you will be changing colors to create Ron's sweater. You will do so in single crochet as you have been following the number of each color for each row. (example 4b, 3g= 4 burgundy and 3 gold) b=burgundy g=gold
 - I do not carry the yarn on this pattern. I drop the yarn to the inside of the plush and pick it back up as needed. Carrying it will cause the rows to be thicker in this area.
- 27: 25b, 8q, 27b
- 28: 26b, 8g, 26b
- 29: 26b, 2g, 4b, 2g, 26b
- 30: 26b, 2q, 4b, 2q, 26b

- 31: 26b, 2q, 4b, 2q, 26b
- 32: 26b, 7g, 27b
- 33: 26b, 6g, 28b
- 34: 26b, 7g, 27b
- 35: 26b, 2g, 3b, 3g, 26b
- 36: 26b, 2g, 4b, 2g, 26b
- 37: 25b, 4g, 2b, 4g, 25b
 - From here you will secure gold yarn and continue in burgundy.
- 38-40: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 41: *dec, sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from * (54)
- 42: *dec, sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (48)
- 43: *dec, sc/dc in next 6 st, repeat from * (42)
- 44: *dec, sc/dc in next 5 st, repeat from * (36)
 - Begin stuffing here
- 45: *dec, sc/dc in next 4 st, repeat from * (30)
- 46: *dec, sc/dc in next 3 st, repeat from * (24)
- 47: *dec, sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (18)
- 48: *dec, sc/dc in next st, repeat from * (12)
 - Make sure body is stuffed firmly before closing
- 49: *dec, repeat from *, tie off and weave in ends (6)



Eyes with 3.5 mm hook (make 2)

1: With black yarn create a magic circle, make 5 sc/dc in black and one sc/dc in white inside the magic circle, join to 1^{st} st, tie off and weave in ends (6 sc/dc)

2: With blue yarn join with a sc/dc in the 1^{st} black st of previous round, 1 more sc/dc in same st, 2 sc/dc in next 3 sts (8 sc/dc)

• Next round is continued by joining with a sl st.

3: Change to black and sl st in next 4 sts, change to white and sl st in next 7 sts, tie off and leave length for sewing. (11 sl sts)

• Attach both eyes to face at row 16 with 4 stitches in the space between them. You will want to make sure they are centered on the front of the plush above the R in the sweater.




Wig Cap with 4.00 mm hook

With Orange Yarn

- 1: Begin with Magic Circle or ch 2, create 6 sc/dc in circle and tighten so there is no hole (6)
- 2: 2 sc/dc in each st (12)
- 3: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next, repeat from * (18)
- 4: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 2 st, repeat from * (24)
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- 9: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 7 st, repeat from * (54)
- 10: *2sc/dc in first st, 1 sc/dc in next 8 st, repeat from
 * (60)
- 11-15: sc/dc in each st (60)
- 16: sc/dc in each st, tie off and leave length to sew to body (60)
 - Wig Cap is attached at an angle to the top of the plush, with the front of the cap sitting at row 9 and the back of the cap sitting just above the top of his sweater
 - You will not add your hair until after the Wig Cap is sewn onto the plush. See assembly notes and picture tutorials below for help.

Attaching the hair is fun and easy. After sewing your Wig Cap on you will then cut some lengths for your hair. I cut a bunch but you can always cut more if you run out and I also cut them pretty long so that folded they are about 3.5 inches long.

Step 1: I find where Ron's part will be and do a row straight along that line working from the face to the crown of the head. Folding the pieces in half and then pull the folded piece through with my hook and then use my fingers to pull the ends through the loop. Similar to latch hook.

Step 2: Beginning on the outside round of the cap I work around the last round adding pieces in each st

Step 3: Then I work on every other row and every other stitch until I am at the top of the wig cap or row

Then he needs a haircut! I made mine a little messy but shorter and a bit more manageable than his best friend's.
